1 Touch Project Self-Defense Program in Hawaii

Dear AJI Members,

I have the pleasure of writing to you about the recent successful collaboration between the American Jujitsu Institute and the 1Touch Project. Some of you

may know from the AJI website that there has been an ongoing partnership between the AJI and the 1Touch, a self-defense curriculum for people legally viewed as vulnerable members of society. The 1Touch has been operating for over a year now on the islands, creating instructors with special skill sets to work with people who

are blind, deaf/blind, veterans and people with mobility impairments. The Coaching Certification Courses (CCC) have been consistently funded by the Atherton Family Foundation, a charity solely dedicated to Hawaiian residents in need of support and training/relief.

Professor Kainoa Li provided the initial location for the training a year ago in his dojo and was attended in large by his student body. The majority of those Probate Coaches, including Professor Li, Sensei John Rieck, Chase Kaanoi, and Nathan Young, have recently moved on to become fully licensed 1Touch Coaches and are given all support to work within those communities who are legally viewed as vulnerable members of society. It has been a pleasure to work with those young men and women who took the time to learn the adaptive tools necessary to reach those people who might not otherwise feel confident to attend a Jujitsu or martial arts school.

On the 4-6th of June this year the second annual Hawaii 1Touch was once again funded through the kind generosity of the Atherton Family Foundation. It would be impossible to reach those in need without the grant given by this prestigious foundation. The venue for the 3 day CCC was donated by the Assistive Tech-

nology Resource Center of Hawaii (ATRC). The care and dedication shown by CEO Barbara Fischlowtz-Leong cannot be emphasized enough. Without Barbara's perseverance, courage and compassion (mandatory traits within the Kodenkan although not herself a practitioner) made this CCC possible. Barbara's right hand man, Monty Anderson-Nitahara was in constant contact with the staff of the 1Touch and acted under some very tight timelines to ensure that all ran smoothly. The hospitality shown to the 1Touch staff from Barbara was a true experience of the Aloha Spirit.

I cannot personally thank Professor Scott Horiuchi enough for putting us in contact with the Pagoda Hotel for last minute reservations (putting it lightly) that was a necessity through no one's fault in particular. It was

Horiuchi Sensei's timely response and personal introductions that gave the 1Touch Staff a fantastic introduction to the hotel staff.

As always the most important people to any seminar, presentation, conference or exposition are the end users, those people will take the knowledge and disseminate to their communities, improving the lives of all. This principle should be a given truth to any practitioner of the Kodenkan and one that needs no explanation in this article. As of the 6th of June there are now 11 1Touch Probate Coaches in Hawaii! They shall remain Probate Coaches until a thorough final exam is undertaken up to 6 months from the CCC in June. I hope that the photos provided will give some of you the real Kokua and Ohana that was generated during this wonderful event. It is a personal hope that some of you will contact any or all of the above mentioned people who not only contributed but made this event a reality. It is so easy to take people for granted. We must always guard against this.

I could go on. As a lifetime member of the AJI and it's Official European Representative I thank all of the people and institutions who have helped so many others.

Seifukujutsu Corner


